SUPERINTENDENT TRANSITION

It was with sincere regret that the Board of Directors accepted and announced the resignation of LM Superintendent, Dr. Pam Tieszen. January 14, 2022 was Dr. Tieszen's last day. She is looking forward to living closer to her family and accepted the position of Vice President of Advancement at Bethel College in Kansas.

Under Pam's leadership the past five years, LM has made many strategic achievements which have strengthened the school. This past year our enrollment increased, and we are well prepared for the campus unification in the fall of 2022. Dr. Tieszen put in place an exceptionally talented Administrative Team, and the school is well positioned for continued growth.

INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT NAMED

The Board named Elaine Moyer as Interim Superintendent. She joined the staff on January 18, 2022. Elaine brings a wealth of educational administration experience - 11 years as Executive Associate Director of Mennonite Education Agency, and prior to that, 20 years as Chief School Administrator at Christopher Dock High School. She has also worked as an administrator, professor and teacher in elementary, high



school and college settings. Elaine will serve as an excellent facilitator and resource to the Administrative Team and Board throughout this semester.

Elaine shares, "LM is on a trajectory from what is to what will be. It gives me joy to support leadership as we together live in the transitional space that imagines the creativity that unification of campuses brings and the opportunities that PreK-12th grade education has when students and faculty are in close

proximity. I'm excited to be part of the conversations and planning that bridge from today to tomorrow, and continue to strengthen the educational excellence that LM offers."

The Board and Search Committee have begun the search process to select a new Superintendent for the upcoming school year.

In closing, I am excited that this edition of *Bridges* highlights the amazing histories and people who are part of the Locust Grove and New Danville school communities and their reflections on what God has in store for LM. We're excited about

the unification and updates for the school and will continue to provide excellence in education today and for the future. We invite your prayers during this transition.

LOCUST GROVE CAMPUS EST. 1939



n 1935, a group of Mennonites met to discuss opening a private Christian school for their children to attend.

After much prayer, counsel and research, in 1938 nine persons went to a public auction of East Lampeter School District's "little red schoolhouses." They bought the "Locust Grove Schoolhouse" for \$1,900 at its original location at 1901 Old Philadelphia Pike, now High Steel Structures. 32 students were enrolled when they opened their doors.

By the late 1950's, the Locust Grove Schoolhouse was bursting at the seams as more families were flocking to the school to receive the benefits of Christian education. In 1960, a 10-acre tract of land was purchased east of the "little red schoolhouse" at 2257 Old Philadelphia Pike for \$21,500. In 1964, students moved into the newly constructed school with a multipurpose room, office space, and six classrooms. The school continued to expand over the next 25 years to add a second story addition of twelve classrooms and offices.

In 2011, the school added a Spanish Immersion track curriculum for students starting in Kindergarten.
The school had added Conversational Spanish in 1960, so this harkened back to former days. This also matched the school's values of preparing students for being compassionate global citizens, whether they served abroad or interacted with people in their own communities.

The school has moved locations multiple times, but the unifying threads of teaching about Jesus, passionate teachers, and being a caring community have remained consistent throughout the school's history.

cting on a concern to have local Christian education, numerous Mennonite families in the Willow Street area formed and opened the new "Willow Street School" in 1940. This first school building was a one-room former tinsmith shop in Willow Street. The shop was chosen because of its many windows, which provided good natural light for students to read, write, and to learn arithmetic, science and Bible studies.

Emily Kraybill was the first teacher at the school, and she became something of a legend during her 19 years teaching at New Danville. The school started with 23 students in eight grades, and a three-member board.

Four years later, in 1944, a new spacious two-room building was constructed on Sprecher Road between the villages of New Danville and West Willow. By 1950, the enrollment at the "New Danville Mennonite School" had grown to 83 students.

On the school's 10th Anniversary, enrollment had increased to 91 students, with three teachers, ten grades, including middle school and some high school courses, and was overseen by a five-member board.

In the late 70's, the school was outgrowing the Sprecher Road building, and in the fall of 1978, moved to its current location along Long Lane.

The years have brought many changes, but a strong tradition of Mennonite/Anabaptist Christ-centered teaching and being a caring community has remained consistent throughout the school's history.




The search process for a Middle School Principal, Grades 5-8, for next school year is currently underway, and this new Principal will be named soon!




A new front entrance to the middle and high school has been chosen; see design renderings in the images below. Our goal is for this project to begin construction after school is out in June 2022.



KEY CURRICULUM - In the process of moving toward unification, we have heard from parent surveys, listening sessions, teacher input and the work of the Program Taskforce that there are definite priorities for our curriculum focus. LM has identified faith integration, fine arts, STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math), world languages, and outdoor education as top priorities for curriculum.

Both our art and music departments are working to create a unified PreK-12 program that fosters a love of the arts as a vital part of our education.

STEAM courses have been added to the high school while Makerspace is being incorporated into both the social studies and science curriculum in elementary. Middle schoolers will have a heavy focus on design thinking and problem solving.

Students in grade 6 will have the opportunity to explore global cultures and get a taste of Spanish and German while 7th and 8th

graders will have a world language added into their schedule, allowing them to reach higher levels of language learning in high school.

All students will have more opportunities to take advantage of our 95-acre campus to connect the outdoors with their learning. There is excitement around connecting our greenhouse with new garden plots and creating unique areas for classrooms outside.

In every aspect, LM remains committed to infusing our faith into all that we do. Teachers are refocusing their curriculum to more visibly incorporate our core values (pictured left) into their instruction and activities so that every subject area points to our mission.

12 YEARS OF SPANISH IMMERSION AT LM

It is hard to believe that the first class of Spanish Immersion (SI) students will be graduating in 2023! Even as we enter the 12th year of our program, we continue to learn and grow.

The elementary program is working to update and refine their language program to more closely align with the new Language Arts program adopted by the English classes while still holding immersion distinctives. The middle school maintenance phase of SI will remain as a social studies and language course in the new middle school program.

The options for our High School immersion students are expanding. Immersion students in 9th and 10th grade can take AP Spanish Language and Culture for two consecutive years. One year focuses on the history and culture of South America while the other year focuses on Mexico, Central America, and the Caribbean. Students can take the AP test after either year. AP Spanish Literature and Culture will be offered every other year so students can take this course either their 11th or 12th grade year. Immersion students can also serve as peer tutors in Spanish courses and participate in service learning opportunities that require their use of Spanish.

REIMAGINING MIDDLE SCHOOL


Teachers from both the Locust Grove and Lancaster campuses have been working to develop an exciting new curriculum that takes the best from each current middle school program and creates something new for the coming year.

While 5th grade will be housed with the middle school program, these classes will remain self-contained. The core curriculum is a continuation of elementary programming with a focus on foundational skills to prepare for the transition to middle school.

The program for 6th grade is driven by two overarching semester themes. Students change classes to not only have content-specific instruction, but also to learn a variety of skills to prepare them for collaboration, communication, critical thinking, and creativity. The year culminates in an interdisciplinary project that celebrates their learning.

The 7th and 8th grade experience is framed around a driving question, creating a focused theme each quarter. Each content area class has instruction that fits into that overarching theme and promotes project-based learning in that discipline. The quarter culminates with an interdisciplinary project focused on answering that driving question, which allows for student choice in presenting their learning.

Middle school instruction is rich in project-based learning and design thinking courses. Students have the opportunity to study world languages and incorporate outdoor education and service learning into their courses.



FINANCIAL REPORT

FINANCIALLY STRONG By Lorri Hengst, LM CFO & Interim Administrative Team Lead

Lancaster Mennonite School remains financially strong, and the unification process is on schedule. The endowment has grown from \$7.8M to \$10.2M over the last year. This helps ensure the sustainability of LM, benefiting both current and future students. The endowment funds provide financial support to programs like drama, athletics, academic support, music and FFA to name a few. The proceeds from the Locust Grove campus will be used to further strengthen the endowment as well as fund a portion of the unification renovations.

Our Business Office is working toward GAAP compliance over the next 2-3 years. The annual financial review now reflects some of these changes, including writing a Revenue Recognition Memo as well as identifying expenses based on Endowment, Program and Fundraising.





* The endowment value is reported differently starting with the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 due to recommended changes by our accountants after working through our financial review process.

The Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Special Purpose Entities (SPE) are state programs that allow eligible businesses or individuals to receive up to a 90% tax credit on contributions to a qualifying organization, such as LM. It is used to support LM students and families through need-based tuition aid.


