# **AWAKENING THE HEARTS OF STUDENTS**

n my AP Biology class this year, I heard a student say, "I just don't get it.

How does this work?"

This question is music to a teacher's ears. My response?

"That's a great question.

That's what you need to figure out."

I personally didn't know the answer. This student, Jarod, wanted to explain the mechanisms that caused his group's plants to grow towards light. Jarod wanted to know something that went beyond the scope of the curriculum. "How is it possible that a hormone that is produced across the top of the plant has a different effect on one side of the plant than the other?" The answers that he found had to do with photoreceptors, transport proteins, and plants' ability to tell the difference between types of light.

Jarod's curiosity and the explanation of phototropism ultimately made me say, "WOW, God's creation is absolutely amazing!!!"

# Middle School Project Showcase Night

After our Middle School Project Showcase Night this spring a parent said, "What a great evening!"

His eyes were energized! We had just completed an evening where middle school students were able to showcase the airplanes they had designed in Mr. Todd Bowman's Engineering & Design class. The students explained the design process - the thinking, planning, and collaboration that was required to create and recreate their airplanes so they could accomplish the task of flying their plane as far as possible. After seeing the plane their child had created

and the process that led to it, this parent was both excited and refreshed.

One of our core values at LM is to nurture curiosity and creativity. These attributes are planted in each of our students by their Creator. To nurture these traits, we simply need to care for them and encourage them to grow. Why would God instill curiosity and creativity within us? I believe one reason for this is to draw us, and those around us, closer to God and to glorify Him.

Curiosity: As we nurture curiosity, students become familiar with observing, asking questions, and digging deeper to find truth. God is truth and the source of truth. Truth is revealed generally as we observe creation, and truth is revealed in a special way in God's word. Before being saved by faith in Jesus, our hearts are hardened. We can be curious and discover truth, but it does not lead us to knowing or glorifying God. When, by God's grace, we are redeemed, our hearts are made new and truth leads us to know and glorify God.

**Creativity:** The first description of God in the Bible is as a creator. Shortly after that we are told that God created humankind in His own image. Part of God's image is creativity. When we create things, it reflects the image of God the creator in us. Again, for those whose hearts are made new, seeing creativity leads to glorifying God. In the case of the parent mentioned earlier, they were energized by seeing the creative image of God in their child.

At LM, we are nurturing curiosity and creativity while inviting God to awaken the hearts of our students, so they are equipped to know and glorify God all their lives. As our students leave LM, we pray that they will continue to grow these traits, that God will be glorified, and that "together we will change the world".

**BEN LESHER '05** is the President & Founder of Parcel B Development Company, husband of **RACHEL (MOFFETT) LESHER '05**, and parent of two current LM students. Through his work, he places an intentional emphasis on developing buildings that promote economic vibrancy, sustainability, and community enhancement. Ben and Rachel live in Lancaster City and attend East Chestnut Street Mennonite Church.

We asked Ben about the way curiosity and creativity have affected his professional and personal life journey.

# Q: What role does curiosity and creativity play in your work and life?

I have always been a curious observer from a young age and asked questions about places I visited. Why do people live where they do, how are cities organized and built, what makes a place special and meaningful to its inhabitants?

One of the most exhilarating parts of being a developer is creating a vision for a place. Envisioning what something could become is an exciting process and takes a lot of creativity. It often feels like not just producing the pieces but also then fitting them together in a complex and sometimes impossible puzzle.

# Q: Were there particular experiences or teachers at LM that nurtured curiosity and creativity in you?

I think it may have been a Tech and Design class taught by Aiden Stoltzfus where my curiosity for engineering and technical design started. It was one of the first times I was

able to explore my creativity for architecture and buildings. We had the opportunity to design a house using a computer software design program to create our own floor plan and elevation drawings. I remember being so excited to go that it almost didn't feel like a class.

Q: Does curiosity and creativity play a role in your faith? I think a lot about how my faith shapes my worldview and

how that may be different from other people's worldview. It helps me consider my own blind spots, what is important to me, and maybe some commonalities that we can build on.

# Q: Why have you chosen to work to address housing needs in our community?

Growing up in an Anabaptist family with parents and grandparents who worked in human services, I was exposed to the values of social justice,

reconciliation, and service, and they resonated with me from a young age. In college, I was particularly interested in poverty alleviation, income inequality and urban issues. I eventually found the field of urban planning and decided I wanted to pursue that as a career. Working for another developer and experiences in graduate school eventually led me to the adjacent/overlapping fields of housing development and advocacy.

I'm passionate about developing housing because everyone needs a home. It also allows me to use my business acumen and talents for good. I decided to move away from planning and into development because of the type of impact I could make. Instead of just making plans for good, as a developer I can implement and build housing to create meaningful places for people in my own community.

where we were warmly welcomed. There was food, live music, and a playground for the kids...It was fantastic!"







The experience was fun, but also impactful on a deeper level. She shares that it helped her connect the world of science to faith. "Science helped me to understand what was happening, while my faith helped me to fully appreciate the awe that comes with experiencing a natural phenomenon."

**STEPHEN EDWARDS '03** is no stranger to the awe of outer space. In his role as

Mission Architect at NASA - Marshall Space Flight Center, he is responsible for developing spacecraft designs and space mission concepts.

Edwards says,
"I consider my
work to be a



worshipful act. Proverbs 25:2 says 'It is the glory of God to conceal things, but the glory of kings is to search things out.' Through our seeking and finding, more of God's glory is revealed."

Curiosity and creativity play a big part in his work as well! He shares that, "Curiosity motivates our science and exploration objectives, which in turn call forth our creativity to figure out how we might achieve them. God has placed us in His great creation, and He has made us in His image! Exercising our creativity is necessary if we are to explore what this image-bearing means and learn to be good stewards of it."

EMILY STEVENS '17 teaches kindergarten through 2nd grade autistic support. Her students are significantly impacted by their autism, so her primary focus is working with them on communication and verbal behavior skills.

She says, "Most of the learning that my students do is driven by their own interests and curiosity, and my goal is to help them make sense of the things they encounter in their environment through that curiosity. The

students that I work with impact my life in so many ways. They help me to laugh, to challenge myself, and to be curious about the world."

A highlight of her experience at Lancaster Mennonite was the teachers and how they each took a genuine interest in helping her grow. "I hope to be the type of teacher that makes that kind of an impact on my students as well." She especially loved social studies courses with Sheri Wenger. "I originally went into my undergraduate college experience planning on becoming a high school history teacher. God just had different plans."

In addition, LM helped her to learn more about faith and pursue Jesus. She felt immersed in a "Christ-centered community and environment. I was constantly encouraged to be curious in my faith, to ask questions, and to continue to push myself."

## USING CREATIVITY IN WELDING







artistic mediums. In these classrooms his love of art grew, curiosity and creativity were nurtured, and he began to consider pursuing art as a career.

He encourages young people to think outside-the-box and to, "Go before the Lord, into Scripture, and look at the apostles and how they took risks. They left an ordinary fishing village to become fishers of men - not exactly the career outlook move!"

When reflecting on the core values of nurturing curiosity and creativity, Mike shares, "Curiosity is huge. Especially when looking at the life of Jesus. Look at the questions He asked. It led to a discovery process for all that heard His voice, and that discovery process led to learning for His audience. The closest disciples would get bigger nuggets of information because they inquired. This model of nurturing curiosity and creativity led the disciples, and now the students of LM, to innovative thought patterns."

"Like the Creator we are creative. We are made in the image of the Creator and must do all that we can and be creative with what is given to us."




