THE TRUE FRUIT OF LIFELONG LEARNING

Lancaster Mennonite empowers lifelong learning by fostering a Christcentered educational environment that encourages curiosity, critical thinking, and personal growth throughout a student's entire life. The school's diverse academic programs and extracurricular activities provide students with opportunities to develop skills that prepare them for both higher education and meaningful careers. By integrating faith with learning, students are equipped to approach challenges with resilience and a commitment to serving others. This is not only important for their future careers but also for brain health, well-being, personal relationships, growing in their faith, and actively participating in the community.

In the elementary school, students engage in inquiry-based learning, hands-on science experiments, and collaborative projects. These activities spark curiosity and build critical thinking skills, encouraging a love of learning from a young age. Programs like "Readers Workshop" develop a passion for reading, while technology integration helps students build digital literacy.

At the middle and high school levels, students are empowered through

project-based learning and personalized academic tracks.

Middle schoolers work on interdisciplinary projects that challenge them to connect their learning across subjects, such as creating sustainable ecosystems or designing service projects for the community.

High school students have access to Advanced Placement courses, internships, and dual enrollment with local colleges, allowing them to explore specific interests and future career paths.

Faith formation is woven into all aspects of learning at Lancaster Mennonite. Bible and faith formation classes encourage students to explore the Bible and seek Jesus together. Chapel services provide space for worship and reflection, with guest speakers sharing insights that help students deepen their faith. Teachers also incorporate faith into everyday

coursework, helping students see God's presence in all subjects and contexts. Volunteer service is another important part of the LM experience, encouraging students to integrate faith into action by serving others. These experiences set a strong foundation for students to carry their faith with them throughout life.


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A personal example of this integration can be seen in my experience as Assistant Superintendent this past year. One unexpected opportunity was teaching our orchestra students in the fall before our new string instructor, Ms. Ziegler, arrived. Drawing on my background as a music teacher, I led the students through rehearsals, which reminded me of the valuable life skills developed in a music ensemble. When making great music together, one key ingredient is irreplaceable: time. Creating excellent music together requires time and patience—there's no shortcut to mastering techniques, rhythms, or dynamics. Students must practice over and over before they reach their full potential as a group.

This process mirrors the journey of lifelong learning. Just as musicians cannot fast-track their way to musical excellence, students must dedicate time and effort to grow in valuable skills and wisdom.

Here at Lancaster Mennonite, we strive to help students understand that the ultimate goal of lifelong learning is becoming Jesus' disciples. All our other learning is meant to flow from this core foundation of knowing and becoming like Jesus. Like the first followers of Jesus, this journey involves spending time with Him—listening, watching, and learning. It's a daily process that builds over time. This results in biblical wisdom, habits, and skills contributing to God's kingdom.

For our students to grasp this lifelong learning, it will take more than simply learning the right content. It is learning to think like Jesus, talk like Jesus, live like Jesus. As parents, teachers, and mentors who lead students, the best way for us to lead them in becoming disciples of Jesus is for us to keep growing in our own apprenticeship of Jesus as we keep spending time with our students whether in the orchestra rehearsal room,

My heart is filled with joy every time I get to perform music with students in a concert. We get to share, as a gift, the fruit of all the many hours of intentional learning that led to that performance. This is the true fruit of lifelong learning: disciples of Jesus sharing his love and gospel to the ends of the earth.



ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR JARED NISSLEY, MD '03

This year's Alumnus of the Year, **JARED NISSLEY, MD '03,** is a physician with Penn Medicine Lancaster General Health in Family Medicine. He has come to love family medicine because of how it is oriented toward helping patients achieve overall health. Dr. Nissley's medical interests include HIV care, addiction, and improving health care access for the uninsured and underinsured. He shares, "most of all, I appreciate the privilege of being part of people's lives during some of their most joyful and difficult moments."

He also is an instructor in the family medicine residency program, and finds that to be an exciting and stimulating place to work alongside inspiring minds. He worked collaboratively with family medicine residents the past few years to launch a street medicine practice. What started as volunteer work a few times a month has grown into something Jared and his team of three (including a nurse and nurse practitioner) do two to three days a week. "As it became clear the need was much bigger, it became a formal program and a larger part of my job over the past year. That means seeing folks and taking services to parks, day centers, community meals and soup kitchens, and shelters. We try to provide a consistent presence where people can expect us and they can get physical or mental health support."

Jared studied biology in college, but it wasn't until after college, during a year of service with Eastern Mennonite Missions (EMM) in the West Bank, Israel, that Jared started thinking about how to integrate his interests in science and caring for others into a career where he could focus on the whole person as a family physician.

"LM was a very important part of my journey," related Jared Nissley '03. "I learned that God cares about our spiritual wellness and also our wellness



as human beings. I also learned that Jesus wants his followers to work toward a world that reflects the values of his kingdom. I eventually chose a career as a family doctor because I thought it was a way to live out those values."

"More important than anything I learned at LM were the friendships I developed there. The classmates that I met at LMH remain my closest and most trusted friends. The friends I found were the reason I looked forward to school each day."

"When I'm not working, I enjoy spending time with my wife and kids, watching baseball, and reading. I try to read 40-50 books a year." His kids keep him curious.

He shared, "my son is six and is very into the outdoors and nature so he is pushing me to learn things about the natural world. He wants to fish, hunt, and bird watch, so I am re-learning old hobbies and getting to learn some new ones."

In addition, the residency students he teaches also push him to keep learning, "I can't hide behind a topic I don't know about, so I have to be on my toes to keep learning. I enjoy that about my work. I have also developed a willingness to say 'I don't know', and then try to figure it out together."

Jared thinks it's important that lifelong learning is embedded in the LM curriculum, because, "we live in a rapidly changing world. The biggest skills that are needed are responding to ideas, quickly assessing the solution, and then thinking creatively about solving problems. Things I learned about in physics, chemistry, and history have been helpful in having the ability to take different ideas, develop your thoughts, and discuss them with colleagues. Those are skills that I use on a daily basis. The world will look different in 10 years, so you have to be able to engage and do so in a moral way and reflect God's values."

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR FRANK ALBRECHT '76



"Frank was a wonderful person, not perfect, but he did everything out of a desire to follow Jesus and to live out kingdom values." These beautiful words were spoken by Frank's wife, Elizabeth Soto, as she remembered him five months after his death. And they capture perfectly why **FRANK ALBRECHT '76** was nominated and selected to be one of Lancaster Mennonite's Alumni of the Year.

Known by many as Brother Frank, he was a lifelong educator, community leader, and servant of Jesus. After serving with Mennonite Central Committee in Colombia, he spent much of his life working with young people. He established and implemented mediation programs for schools throughout Lancaster County, helping students to learn and practice peacebuilding, conflict resolution, and reconciliation.

Frank was also known for his acts of kindness in his neighborhood, church, and family. In June of 2023, Frank was diagnosed with ALS and he passed away in August of 2024. We are so grateful for the impact Frank made in so many of our lives, and for the ongoing impact he has left on his students and the broader Lancaster community. He is being honored as an Alumnus of the Year in memoriam because he embodied the LM core values of Seeking Jesus Wholeheartedly, Building Bridges of Peace, and Living Compassionately.

It was a gift for Dr. Michael Badriaki, LM Superintendent, to have the opportunity to present Frank with a framed painting of Lancaster Mennonite's Iron Bridge during Frank's retirement party, in recognition of the significant impact he has made on the world.

the friendships his grandchildren are starting now in PreK and 1st grade that will impact them the rest of their lives.




NANCY WITH HER FOUR CHILDREN AND SIX GRANDCHILDREN


Be curious! Be curious about yourself, your family, community, and the world.

Richard's journey toward lifelong learning began early, influenced by his mother's desire to teach, and by his music teacher at LMH, Arnold Moshier. Mr. Moshier encouraged Richard to participate in musical activities like the Men's Chorus and the LM Senior Class Chorus, experiences that helped develop his leadership skills and nurtured his love for music.

Curiosity is central to Richard's philosophy. He encourages young people to "Be curious! Be curious about yourself, your family, community, and the world." His own curiosity has led him to explore a variety of interests, from piano lessons to reading about historical figures and current events. Putting in consistent hours of practice, rehearsal, research, and discernment is part of Esteban's quest for lifelong learning in the worship experience. Just as important as the musicianship and technological know-how in effectively leading a congregation in musical praise comes the desire to continuously grow closer to the Lord. "I read several books a month on the subject of worship." It is his commitment to lifelong learning that drives him to find the right sound, song, and message for any given worship service.





When you hear the words "Donor Advised Fund" (DAF), perhaps you immediately think that it's probably something that's not for you. Maybe it sounds like it's for someone older, or younger, or who has more complicated assets, or who gives way more than you do.

Age of Donor Advisors

But that's not true! According to the National Study on Donor Advised Funds, at the end of 2021, almost half of all DAFs had less than \$50,000 in them. 25% of DAF Advisors are under the age of 55. Donor Advised Funds may be a great tool for you!





Within this dataset, the age of the donor advisors varied widely. Figure 3.3A shows that the most common ages for donor advisors were between 55-80 years old.

DAFs are one of the fastest growing tools for charitable giving in the US. Out of the 1.78 million DAFS in the U.S. in 2024, one in four were established since 2020. And it's easy to understand why:

- They provide immediate tax benefits
- They are simple to set up and use
- They grow and therefore enable larger gifts




FINANCIAL REPORT
