There are twelve of us, JEAN (LEHMAN) SHOWALTER, LUANNE (EBERSOLE) HORST, SUE (GINGRICH) MARTIN, DEB (WEAVER) WEAVER, JEAN (LANDIS) SENSENIG, MIRIAM (RISSER) ZEHR, CHARLENE (LEHMAN) HARNISH, MARYANN (GOOD) HOOVER, NAOMI (MARTIN) MILLER, BETTY LOU (HORNING) EBERLY, ANITA FREY, AND KAREN (HOOVER) COPENHAVER - which includes one day student, that formed a strong bond of friendship that continues after 55 years. During our last two years of school at LMH, we learned to trust and appreciate each other through studying, praying, singing, serving, working, spending weekends together, and also participating in shenanigans that brought consequences from Miss Hoover, our dorm matron.

We wanted to continue relating to each after our graduation in June, 1972. Initially, we got together on special weekends, eventually attending our weddings, and picnics with our growing families. We connected many years through handwritten circle letters, until we adapted to the convenience of e-mail, and more recently by group texts.

Through the years, our individual "ministries" have included nursing, teaching, pastoring, mentoring, secretarial work, painting, farming, and business owners. Our families

In 1985, six young women graduated from LMH—KRISTINA (ROTH) MARTIN, KATHY (RUTT) BEILER, JOY (FREY) MARTIN, MARCY (LEAMAN) SIMS, BETH ANN BRUBAKER, AND DEBORAH WEAVER (an additional friend, Andrea Martin, a graduate of Eastern Mennonite High School and EMU, joined the group). Four decades later, despite now living in Lancaster and Cochranville, PA; Portland, OR; Chicago, IL; and Chapel Hill, NC, their bond remains strong—a friendship that began in high school and has only deepened with time.

Their connection was sparked by a shared sense of humor and the joy of laughter. During high school, they supported one another through the challenges of teenage life, finding refuge in each other's presence. "We went to each other's houses, stayed up late and did things like eat cereal at midnight and laugh till we cried," they recall. "Through the years many of us would have a class or two together, and this provided the opportunity to send each other notes, or doodle in the margins of each other's notebooks." These everyday moments laid the foundation for lifelong friendships built on connection, encouragement, and fun.

Despite the demands of careers and family, the group has prioritized reconnecting through long weekend gatherings every couple of years. A group text keeps them in close contact between visits, and their reunions have become sacred times of laughter, storytelling, and honest conversation. Through life's celebrations and hardships, they've chosen to show up for each other.

Central to their connection is a deep-rooted commitment to Anabaptist principles—particularly peacebuilding and nonviolence. Kristina shares, "We are committed to peacebuilding and that is a common thread that we share. We work intentionally at this commitment to peace - be it

interpersonally, at our places of work, in the broader community, and globally."

Their friendship is more than nostalgic; it's become a sustaining force. Kristina reflects, "We are deeply grateful for our friendships that have spanned the many years from high school to the present day. There's something rare and precious about growing up with people you love and know so well. It's an irreplaceable treasure."

Their story reminds us that when friendships are rooted in love, laughter, and shared faith, they truly can last a lifetime.

Throughout the years, their friendship continued to grow. As they moved on to LM for high school, athletics continued to be a favorite activity, whether soccer, basketball or baseball, or cheering on their favorite team. In their free time, they could also be found doing science experiments together, building on concepts they learned in chemistry class with Mr. Duane Evans, or spending time together at Adrian Groff's family cabin.

After graduation but before they headed separate ways for college, they gathered a group of eight guys, ADRIAN GROFF '03, JON HEINLY '03, ANDY HOOVER '03, JOSH HYKES '03, RANDY KEENER '03, **JARED NISSLEY '03, CLINTON SIMMONS** '03, and JUSTIN WEAVER '03, for one last epic adventure. With the shared dream of seeing a polar bear, they all piled into an old Suburban and drove deep into Canada. Several breakdowns later, one of which included laying hands on the Suburban to pray for it, and then successfully driving all the way home afterwards, they arrived home with memories and friendships to last a lifetime.

After college this initial group of four guys had weekly calls to support and prayer for one another. They don't agree on everything, but there is enough substance to their relationships that carry them through even the differences and help them learn from one other. Even now they continue to check in regularly with updates, prayer requests, and encouragement for each other.

Last year when Jared Nissley was being honored as alumni of the year, a group of these guys from their class surprised him by reserving seats at the Gala event so they could be there to support and celebrate with him.

They acknowledge that these types of friendships are really unusual. Jon Heinly shares, "to have people that have known you for so much of your life, and walked through making major decisions together - career, relationships, and more. We have accompanied each other on these journeys - it really makes a difference."

His encouragement to current students is to, "have the courage to make the first move towards friendship with others. Your peers are looking for it too. Don't be afraid to step towards them."

When **SANGBIN LEE '18** transferred to Lancaster Mennonite as a sophomore, he had just moved from South Korea and faced the daunting challenge of starting over in a new culture, a new language, and a new school. Despite the uncertainty, he found community faster than he expected.

"I was pretty nervous at first coming in, not knowing anyone and adjusting to a new environment," Sangbin recalled. "Lucky enough, I quickly found my people through baseball and Campus Chorale. Whether it was just hanging out in the dugout or traveling for a choir concert, I started building friendships that felt real and welcoming."

Sangbin credits the LM environment for helping him form authentic relationships with students from many different backgrounds. He especially remembers the everyday moments—little conversations with friends, shared experiences on the field or stage, and the comfort of being accepted just as he was.

One of his most meaningful LM experiences came during his senior year during mini course—a backpacking trip to the Grand Canyon led by teacher Mr. Thurber. "We didn't have our phones the whole time, which gave us a chance to just talk, hike, make meals together, and bond with one another," he said. "I still look back at pictures from that trip and remember how special it felt to just disconnect from everything and be fully present with friends."

Now several years out of high school, Sangbin still values the friendships he formed at LM. "We've all gone in different directions since high school, but there's something special about people who knew me during those years," he said. "Having friends from a whole new background speaking my second language feels unique, and I'm truly thankful for the friendships that we built."

For Sangbin, those connections remain lifelong.

RUNNING TOWARD FRIENDSHIP: MILE BY MILE

When MINGYANG "FRANK" WANG '16 arrived at Lancaster Mennonite in August 2012, he was a 13-year-old stepping onto U.S. soil—and outside of China—for the first time. The dorm became his first home away from home, and his earliest LM friendships began there.

"My earliest friendships in the dorm, like the one with **ZHENGCHENG LI '15**, gave me a sense of belonging and stability when everything around me was unfamiliar." Zhengcheng, a sophomore transfer from Shanghai, was known for his tech skills, love of gaming, and deep knowledge of world history that sparked great conversations. The two still keep in touch more than a decade later.

Some of Frank's most formative experiences came from an unexpected place—running cross-country. "The team became my bridge to others. Running side by side with teammates from different backgrounds, united by the same goal, dissolved those invisible walls. In every practice, every race, and every shared moment of exhaustion and triumph, I found friendships that transcended culture. Cross-country

taught me more
than how to
run—it taught me
how to push past
limits, connect
across differences,
and find common
ground in shared
effort. Those
lessons have
stayed with me
long after the
races ended."

Over the years, Frank has maintained LM friendships

in surprising ways. He and ALEX MALAVE '16, who met on their first day at LM, later attended Franklin & Marshall College together and years later found themselves living in the same city—Durham, North Carolina—while Frank was earning his master's at Duke University and Alex was working there. Another lasting bond is with QIAODAN LOU '16, a fellow member of LM's Chinese international freshmen when he started, with whom he volunteered with teaching English in Guizhou, China. "Instagram has been one of my main tools for staying connected with friends over the years," he shares.

Now ESG Manager at Norin Mining in Beijing, Frank credits LM's multicultural environment for broadening his worldview and preparing him to work with diverse communities. "In many ways, my LMH friendships taught me how to listen with empathy, respect different worldviews, and collaborate toward shared goals—skills I carry with me in both my professional and personal life."

His advice to students: be open, intentional, and step outside your comfort zone—friendships formed here can last far beyond graduation.

Many people use their IRAs as a tool for generosity during their lifetime. Through Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs), you can both avoid income tax and support your favorite charities!

What people may not realize is that IRAs are also a tax-wise asset to leave to charities.

IRAs that are inherited are taxed as income. The average retirement account in the U.S. for people over the age of 60 is over \$250,000. This means that the account would be taxed at a rate of at least 32% or \$80,000.

In designating a charity as your IRA beneficiary, you completely avoid this tax, providing the organization with the maximum benefit of your gift. Other assets, like life insurance, do not incur income taxes and are a much more efficient way to provide for your children and loved ones.


